With the addition of an Esports team on campus, gaming has climbed to a whole new level at Alfred State College (ASC).

The Alfred State Esports team launched this spring, and affords students the opportunity to go head-to-head against other colleges in many competitive games, including Overwatch, Rainbow Siege Six, League of Legends, and Super Smash Bros.

ASC is now a member of Tespa, founded to promote positive attributes of gaming culture and to host the best college Esports events and competitions.

A new Esports Suite in the Student Leadership Center provides the team with new computer equipment and a high-energy environment for players to practice and compete. Alfred State's Esports adviser and the student coach are available to assist in training of players and to promote best practices for a responsible balance of academic study and team play.

The Esports Suite is in addition to another Games Nation Suite for console game players.

The Esports team complements Alfred State's new game and interactive design AS and BS programs, which are set to launch in the fall of 2019. Students in these programs will be exposed to many different facets of interactive media, and will become prepared for a wide variety of occupational opportunities, including game design, UX (user experience design, interactive entertainment, and more.

Attendance Blooms at Spring Career Fairs

With each passing year, Alfred State's spring career fairs continue to blossom. This year was no exception, as more employers than ever before came to both campuses to recruit Pioneers.

A total of 105 employers were on-hand for the 2019 Alfred campus career fair, compared to 92 employers in the spring of 2018, and 73 employers in 2017. As for the Wellsville campus' spring career fair, 91 employers attended in 2019, compared to 80 in 2018 and 68 in 2017.

The number of employers that have come to recruit students at the spring nursing and medicalcareer fair has also greatly increased from nine employers in 2017 to 20 in 2019.

Student attendance for the spring 2019 career fairs was also excellent, as 501 students attended the Alfred event, while the Wellsville and nursing career fairs drew 494 and 44 students, respectively.

PIONEERS VOLUNTEER OUT-OF-STATE DURING SPRING BREAK



While spring break is typically considered a time for students to relax and recharge, for Alfred State College (ASC) Pioneers, it's an opportunity to make a difference.

During their recent spring break, a number of ASC students volunteered for one of two out-of-state civic engagement trips in an effort to help those in need.

On the trip to Myrtle Beach, SC, a group of 11 volunteers worked with Habitat for Humanity of Horry County at a construction site, where they helped build an affordable house for a mother and her three children. The trip marked the seventh straight year that the college has partnered with Habitat for Humanity of Horry County.

On a separate trip, a team of four partnered with All Hands and Hearts – Smart Response in disaster recovery efforts in Panama City Beach, FL, an area affected by Hurricane Michael. This was the 24th time that Alfred State has partnered with All Hands and Hearts since 2005.



Alfred State Archery wins multiple medals; three named to East-All Region team

The Alfred State Archery team continued its strong season at the USA Archery East Region Outdoor Collegiate Championships at James Madison University in Harrisonburg, VA.

Alfred State's men's hunter (fixed pins) team consisting of Jacob Patanella, Robert "Jay" Lawrence, and Jacob Pollock, won a gold medal match against Penn Tech. Patanella also earned a secondplace individual finish.

The men's compound (open) team consisting of senior Joshua Harp, Nathan Summerville, and Jacob Houseknecht took silver/ second place after losing a close gold medal match to James Madison University. In addition to these honors, Ethan Frederick took an individual second-place finish in the barebow division.

Capping off a successful weekend, USA Archery announced All-Region winners for the East. Three Alfred State Pioneers achieved this honor for the first time in the history of the program, as Harp, Summerville, and Lawrence all were named to the East All-Region Team.

Veterinary technology (AAS)

Licensed veterinary technicians are indispensable members of the veterinary medical team, capable of providing everything from life support and surgical assistance to physical therapy and nutritional management. Our veterinary technology program is designed to provide students with extensive training in the theory and principles, reinforced with the hands-on technical, animal, and laboratory experience needed to prepare students for this exciting field. Graduates of this program are eligible to sit for the Veterinary Technology National Exam (VTNE), which is the New York State licensing exam for veterinary technicians.





THE ALFRED STATE CLUB HOCKEY TEAM CAPPED AN IMPRESSIVE SEASON BY WINNING THE UPSTATE NEW YORK CLUB HOCKEY LEAGUE (UNYCHL) TIER 2 CHAMPIONSHIP. THE CHAMPIONSHIP IS THE FIRST IN SCHOOL HISTORY FOR THE PIONEERS.

The Pioneers entered the UNYCHL Tournament held at the Bill Gray's Iceplex in Henrietta with a 7-0-1 record. The Blue and Gold defeated Albany College of Pharmacy 4-3 in the semifinals to advance to the championship game.

In the championship contest, the Pioneers matched up with St. John Fisher and earned a 3-0 victory.

The Upstate New York Club Hockey League is an ACHA-affiliated ice hockey league comprising smaller colleges and universities in Upstate New York. The UNYCHL is set up into two Tiers. Tier 1 consists of 21 schools (divided by region) that compete for the UNYCHL championship and an automatic bid to ACHA regionals.

Tier 2 was established as a way for newer programs to develop along with those that want a place to play with fewer restrictions. There are currently 10 members of UNYCHL TIER 2 that compete amongst themselves for a league championship.

ALFRED STATE COLLEGE IS PROUD TO ANNOUNCE THAT ITS FIVE-YEAR BACHELOR OF ARCHITECTURE (BARCH) PROGRAM RECENTLY OBTAINED FULL ACCREDITATION STATUS FROM THE NATIONAL ARCHITECTURAL ACCREDITING BOARD (NAAB).

NAAB is the sole agency authorized to accredit US professional degree programs in architecture. Alfred State's Bachelor of Architecture degree was issued a full three-year term of accreditation, which is the maximum possible term when transitioning from candidacy status.

Dr. Alex Bitterman, chair of the Architecture and Design Department, noted that Alfred State's program is now the only accredited BArch in the State University of New York (SUNY) system. Offering his thoughts on the accreditation, he said, "This validates our commitment to educating and preparing job-ready students for our partners in industry and the region."

Bitterman noted that this achievement marks the culmination of a 15-year endeavor that involved getting the BArch approved as a degree, as well as a seven-year official accreditation process.

"We have been candidates for seven years and

have had three accreditation visits," Bitterman said. "All of our accreditation materials are available online on the college website, so we have full transparency of the entire process from beginning to end. We are now very proud that we have the first fully accredited five-year architecture program in the SUNY system."

Dr. John Williams, dean of the School of Architecture, Management, and Engineering Technology, said, "We are thrilled to announce the full three-year term of NAAB accreditation for our Bachelor of Architecture program. This prestigious certification speaks to the academic excellence and commitment of our faculty in the Architecture and Design Department. NAAB accreditation is yet another distinction defining the quality and distinctiveness of our professional programs offered at Alfred State College."

Students in Alfred State's Bachelor of Architecture program are prepared to become well-rounded, creative, and socially responsible architects who shape the world through the design of meaningful and inspirational spaces and places. The BARCH is a professional program, which endeavors to prepare students for licensure shortly after graduation, reducing the need for further graduate education or an advanced degree.

A third-year class of Alfred State architecture students studying in Sorrento, Italy, participated in the second annual HOME: International Design Event developed and coordinated by architect and author Duo Dickinson, FAIA. Three Pioneers came away with honors, including a secondplace award and two honorable mentions.

The event drew more than 20 entries from programs across the world. Following a lecture by Dickinson on the "Controversy of Beauty," he reviewed each of the submissions in detail, and identified the top four student projects.

Alfred State's Aga Jean Sarno, of Savona, was awarded a second-place book prize in the competition for her entry "A Sustainable Life: Zero Energy Modular Home."

Supporting the claim of sustainability, all the spaces were created by combining used shipping containers. Honorable mentions included Alfred State students Brianna Swartz, of Fort Plain, and Caleb Boyce-Wright, of Buffalo.
