Rape — The penetration, no matter how slight, of the vagina or anus with any body part or object, or oral penetration by a sex organ of another person, without the consent of the victim.

*Note: Under State of Florida Statutes, **sexual battery** is defined as follows: Oral, anal, or vaginal penetration by, or union with, the sexual organ of another or the anal or vaginal penetration of another by any other object; however, sexual battery does not include an act done for bona fide medical purpose. “Consent” - means intelligent, knowing, and voluntary consent and does not include coerced submission. “Consent” shall not be deemed or construed to mean the failure of the alleged victim to offer physical resistance to the offender.*

Fondling —The touching of the private parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, without the consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her age or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental incapacity.

Incest — Sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.

Statutory Rape — Sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent.

*The definition of **rape** is from the Summary Reporting System (SRS) User Manual; whereas, the definitions of **fondling**, **incest**, and **statutory rape** are from the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) User Manual. Both of these manuals are from the FBI’s Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

The term does not include violence in a casual acquaintanceship or violence between individuals who only have engaged in ordinary fraternization in a business or social context.

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- Domestic Violence**— Any assault, aggravated assault, battery, aggravated battery, sexual assault, sexual battery, stalking, aggravated stalking, kidnapping, false imprisonment, or any criminal offense resulting in physical injury or death of one family or household member by another family or household member.
- Stalking**— A person who willfully, maliciously, and repeatedly follows, harasses, or cyberstalks another person commits the offense of stalking.

However, if a reporting person requests anonymity, this request must be honored to the extent permitted by law. Accordingly, no information should be included on this form that would personally identify the victim without his/her consent. Based on information received, the Clery Coordinator will determine the category of the crime or incident and the location under which the incident should be reported in the Annual Security Report. Clery and associated legislation requires that each department's records related to the Clery reportable crime statistics be retained for seven years.
